Steps to Passing a Special Events Sales and Service Policy

Planning Commenced!

With the Key Stakeholders 5 meetings over several months were held exploring policies developed in other communities and current policies in place in the township

A document was developed for presentation to the Town Council.

The Town Council reviewed and adapted the policy to fit into existing turnkey agreements

**Key Stakeholders:

Evaluation will be ongoing.

Key Stakeholders will meet with Prevention Specialist to review outcomes and implement adaptations or changes as they arise.

Alcohol Sales and Service Policy

This policy is created to help protect the owner, staff, and customer from any incident that may arise in the establishment. Here at the _____ we want to help keep our community, staff, and establishment safe from alcohol-related incidents that could be harmful. We ask our employees to adhere to the policies below.

1. Preventing drinking and driving by assisting an intoxicated customer find a safe way home. (by law the restaurant has no right restraining a customer)

Procedures:

- Call a cab or arrange alternate transportation (designated driver)
- Call the police if there is an apparently intoxicated person leaving the bar.

2. In the case of an incident involving problems like refusing service or ejecting a customer make sure to record in the log book.

- Minimally, the report should include what happened, date and time of the incident; name of customer involved; witnesses; what staff did.

3. Staff is not allowed to consume alcohol in this establishment during their shift. (Underage staff is NEVER allowed to consume alcohol).

4. We reserve the right to remove any guest who purchases and supplies alcohol to a minor or to anyone who has already been refused service.

5. We reserve the right to confiscate any alcoholic beverage brought in from outside sources.

6. A server may serve no more than two drinks to a customer in an hour.

7. Our company policy is to card anyone who looks under the age of 30 years old.

8. You, as the server, have the right to stop service at any time due to possible intoxication.

9. For the protection of staff and customers, remove all empty glasses and bottles from your station.

10. Newly hired staff must be state certified to sell and serve alcohol before doing so and will be shadowed by a certified staff member until that time.

11. I understand that I must be certified to sell and serve alcohol within 60 days of hire and every three years. The training must be a Montana state-approved training.

I have read the policy, discussed it with the manager/owner and agree to abide by the provisions contained in it.


